Discuss how parts of the city were destroyed and how they were rebuilt. Find out about how London has changed, including its buildings, people and transport. 		<p>people and places in the locality of Leigh. Find out about the significance of cotton mills and coal mines in Leigh and look at what life was like during the industrial revolution. Use sources, artefacts and photographs to find out about how life in Leigh has changed over time. Complete a fieldwork study in Westleigh.</p> <p>Social/ Cultural</p>	<p>Learn about the importance of Remembrance Day and understand why it is commemorated each year. Learn about the key events and causes and effects of WWI. Find out about what life was like on the front line including the Christmas Truce. Find out about the role of women on the home front. Learn about the role of animals in WWI such as Sergeant Stubby and Gallipoli Murphy. Learn about the life and achievements of Walter Tull as a significant and inspirational individual. Compare Walter Tull to Marcus Rashford and learn about his activism and achievements as an inspirational individual from today.</p> <p>Peace/ Equality/ Teamwork Moral/ Social Democracy/ Tolerance</p>		<p>Find out about the sinking of the Titanic and find out what life was like onboard the ship. Investigate what life was like for the rich and for the poor and link this to the difference in classes/ floors on the Titanic. Discuss how the conditions were different depending on what class you were in - link this to learning about society attitudes in 1912. Investigate what caused the Titanic to sink. Discuss how there were different factors that may have contributed to the event. Discuss how safety on ships has since improved. Look at how transport has developed over time and compare old and new forms of transport.</p> <p>Equality Cultural Individual liberty</p>	<p>Seacole and Edith Cavell Study the lives of Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole and then compare to Edith Cavell. Learn about the Crimean War (where Nightingale and Seacole served) and WWI (where Cavell served - link to pupils prior learning from Autumn 2) and discuss similarities and differences of these two wars. Discuss how these individuals helped to change conditions in hospitals and compare to modern day hospitals, looking how the conditions have improved.</p> <p>Love/ Generosity Moral Mutual respect</p>	
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<p>Year 3</p>		<p><u>Stone Age to Iron Age</u> Learn about changes in Britain from the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age.</p> <p>Teamwork Social/ Cultural Individual liberty</p>	<p><u>Geography unit, covering the following history links:</u> <u>The UK</u> Explore some of the changes that have taken place in the UK over time and look at how the landscape has changed over time. Learn about some of the UK's most important architecture including ancient castles.</p> <p>Equality Social/ Cultural Democracy</p>	<p><u>Overview of the earliest civilisations</u> Complete a mini study giving an overview of when and where the first civilisations appeared and discuss their achievements (Ancient Sumer, Indus Valley, Ancient Egypt and Shang Dynasty). <u>Ancient Egypt</u> Carry out an in-depth study of Ancient Egypt, learning about their achievements as one of the earliest civilisations.</p> <p>Teamwork Spiritual/ Social/ Cultural Democracy</p>
<p>Year 4</p>		<p><u>Roman Britain</u> Learn about the Roman Empire and its impact on Britain.</p> <p>Justice Social/ Cultural Rule of law</p>	<p><u>Geography unit, covering the following history links:</u> <u>Europe</u> Learn about significant events that have happened in Europe (e.g. impact of WWII). Learn about the history of some of Europe's most important architecture.</p> <p>Equality Social/ Cultural Democracy</p>	<p><u>Ancient Greece</u> Carry out an in-depth study of Ancient Greece, learning about Greek life and achievements and their influence on the western world.</p> <p>Equality Spiritual/ Social/ Cultural Democracy/ Individual liberty</p>
<p>Year 5</p>		<p><u>Anglo-Saxons and Scots</u> Learn about Britain's settlement by Anglo-Saxons and Scots. <u>Vikings</u> Learn about the Viking and Anglo-Saxon struggle for the kingdom of England at the time of Edward the Confessor.</p>	<p><u>Geography unit, covering the following history links:</u> <u>Earthquakes, Zones and Volcanoes</u> Learn about the British expedition to Mount Everest in 1953, the first successful attempt to summit Mount Everest. Learn about the lives of Tenzing Norgay and Edmund Hillary who completed the expedition.</p>	<p><u>Local History Study: Victorian Leigh</u> Learn about the Victorian way of life. Learn about the industrial revolution within Leigh looking at local mills and the history of the mills. Study a site that is significant in the locality (Leigh Spinners Mill and Leigh coal mines).</p>

<p>Year 6</p>		<p><u>A significant turning point in British history: The Battle of Britain</u> Learn about WWII to understand the context of the event of the Battle of Britain. Look at the causes of WWII and other significant events that occurred. Complete an in-depth study of the Battle of Britain. Discuss how this is a turning point in WWII as it was the first defeat of Hitler's forces and established Britain as stronghold for the allied forces.
